It's a new year, which means new opportunities. New possibilities. New resolutions. And the chance to break those resolutions within a few days. I never make new year resolutions because I know I am not motivated to keep them. I have tried different things over the years, though, like joining the gym or eating better to varying degrees of success. What I know is that the flesh is weak, and I like donuts.

It can be frustrating being so weak. I am hardly the only one. The first week of January, the gyms are full. The first week of February, the gyms are empty. Change is hard. Especially when we are trying to change deep seated habits in our lives. I have been eating poorly and not exercising for so long that it isn't easy to make the change. I run on the treadmill thinking, "This will be over soon." Some people love exercise, but they have made it a habit and so it has become easy for them.

It all really comes down to habits, doesn't it? Our habits generally define our behaviors. The better the habits, the better the behaviors. For example, my habit is to take my marriage seriously and honor my wife. Thus, my behavior reflects that and I don't mistreat my wife. Of course, the habits must start with intentional behaviors. I had to decide to honor my wife and work hard at it. Then it became a habit. Then the behaviors became simple.

This is all reflected in our spiritual lives as well. Sin is a natural habit for fallen people. We are called to be conformed to Christ and to walk in holiness and righteousness. To do that, we need to create new habits. To create new habits, we need new behaviors. Thank the Lord that he has given us the Holy Spirit to assist us with this. Otherwise, it would be impossible. The Holy Spirit is our helper who empowers us to change. He equips us, renews us, reforms us. We never have to do it alone because the Holy Spirit is always with us.

So let's talk about some changes in behavior that we can make to form better habits, which will encourage better behavior. (It is a vicious cycle.) I am not talking about resolutions. New year resolutions were made to be broken. I am talking about willful, Spirt empowered transformation in our lives.

First, read the bible daily. Don't resolve to read the bible daily. Open your bible every day and read it. Read it with your morning coffee or your evening snack. Read it intentionally. Don't worry about finding the perfect reading plan. Don't worry about reading in order from Genesis to Revelation. Don't worry about how long it will take you to finish the entire bible. Just read it. Read a paragraph. Read a page. Whatever you can start out doing. Remember, behaviors form habits which make for better behaviors. This means that eventually you will get to where you are reading a good chunk or you have a good reading plan. But, to start, you just need to sit down and read.

WALLY'S GALLERY -

Almost 500 years ago a boy was born to a poor German Lutheran family in Weil her Stadt, Germany. His name was Johannas Kepler and although sickly, because of his evident intelligence he earned a scholarship to study Lutheran ministry. During his studies, however, he came upon the mathematical ides of Copernicus, concerning planetary motion and the earth's position in the universe. The prevailing belief of the day was that the earth was the center of the universe with the planets and the sun revolving around the earth. This idea was formulated around 150 AD by the astronomer and mathematician Ptolemy. It was called the Ptolemaic system and was accepted by the Roman Catholic Church as it seemed to be in line with Scripture.

As Kepler leaned more toward the Copernican belief that the planets orbited around the Sun, contrary to the Ptolemaic understanding, he was at odds with the Roman Church. In addition because of his Calvinistic beliefs he was also at odds with the Lutheran Church. This complicated and endanger his life during one of Europe's longest and most brutal wars between Catholics and Protestants; The Thirty Year's War. On many occasions he was forced to move and had to suffer through the deaths of his wife and several children.



Despite all this, Kepler eventually accepted a position as a mathematics and astronomy teacher at a Protestant school in Graz, Germany in 1594. He later became an assistant in the court of mathematician to holy Roman Emperor Rudolf II and eventually to the position of Imperial Mathematician.

Kepler defended Copernicus' theory that the planets orbited the sun rather than the earth, but observations lead him to realize that this theory had a flaw. Copernicus' theory assumed that the planets revolved in a circular orbit at a constant velocity. This theory, however, was contradicted when it appeared that the planet Mars, at times, seemed to reverse directions for a few months before retiring to its original path. Neither the Ptolemaic nor the Copernican model could explain this apparent movement. Kepler finally figured out that contrary to a circular orbit the planets traveled in an elliptical pattern at various speeds depending on their proximity to the sun.

This discovery in itself does not portray the magnitude of Kepler's contribution to science. On a broader scale his discoveries revolutionized science by applying physics (considered at the time as a branch of philosophy) to astronomy; considered a branch of mathematics. Kepler's laws of planetary motion established the discipline of celestial mechanics. From his calculations and writings scientists would be able to provide perpetual tables predicting the planetary positions for any past or future date.

In 1609 his publication on astronomy described his discoveries which have become know as the first two laws of planetary motion. This was the first published account of how a scientist took imperfect data to forge an idea that would clarify a theory and provide a surpassing understanding of nature that corresponded to observations of reality. Today this is known as the scientific method.

All this speaks volumes to the brilliance of this gifted scientist. But not often told in the annuls of history is what drove this man. Kepler had a firm belief in a God of order who created a universe open for discovery. For this He gifted the human mind with the desire to know Him and the mental capacities to unlock the mysteries of His creation. Kepler wrote: "O God, I am thinking Thy thoughts after Thee." In Kepler's view, he saw the image of God in the universe.

In one of his most famous works he wrote: "I commence a sacred discourse, a most true hymn to God the Founder, and I judge it to be piety, not sacrifice...but first to learn myself, and afterwards to teach other too, how great He is in wisdom, how great in power, and of what sort in goodness."

Kepler died in 1630 while on a journey from his home. Within two years his gave was demolished because of the Thirty Years War. He was a man frail in body but strong in mind and faith. He held steadfast to the truths God revealed to him and died not knowing the impact they would eventually have.

Second, pray. Pray every day. Paul says to pray without ceasing. That might be a bit much to start out with. Start small. Pray when you wake up. Pray on your drive to work. Pray over your meals. Pray before bed. Whatever works. But make prayer a priority. Like scripture reading, don't worry about the length of the prayers. Don't worry that you aren't saying the right things or that you aren't good at it. Just talk to God. Start small. Form the habit. Let it grow into a new behavior that becomes fluent and easy conversation with God. The change from forcing yourself to go to the gym every day to looking forward to working out doesn't happen overnight. Don't expect your prayer life to develop overnight either. Everything takes time, practice, effort, commitment. And the help of the Holy Spirit.

I could list other things here as well, but daily scripture reading and daily prayer are enough of a start, and they are hard. Start small. Let the behaviors change you and turn into habits. Let the habits develop better behaviors in you. And through it all, watch your relationship with God blossom like you have never seen before.

THE SEASON OF EPIPHANY


