

"The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost." I Timothy 1:15

<sup>35</sup> And one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. <sup>36</sup> "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" <sup>37</sup> And he said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. <sup>38</sup> This is the great and first commandment. <sup>39</sup> And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. <sup>40</sup> On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets." Matthew 22:35-40

These are both very important passages of scripture, but for two different reasons. The passage from I Timothy I is a summary of the gospel while the passage from Matthew 22 is a summary of the law. It is important that we know and understand the difference between the two.

Under the old covenant was the law, and the law stated what needed to be done by the people. If they kept the law, they were in good standing with God. If they broke the law, then they were subject to his justice. In order to avoid punishment for breaking the law, the Jews had to perform sacrifices that would atone for their sins. The sacrifices had to be repeated regularly because the people kept sinning. The sacrifices, then, were not only atoning sacrifices, but constant reminders of their failure to keep the law.

The gospel is about what Jesus did to free us from sin, and in so doing, to free us from the law. We are still expected to be righteous and holy, but under the new covenant we are judged by whether we have received Christ's righteousness and whether he has died for our sins. That is why I Timothy I:15 is such a good summary of the gospel. The gospel is that Jesus came and died for sinners so that we don't need to die for our own sins. We no longer need the blood of animals, and we don't need to repeat any sacrifices, and we won't have to pay for our sins with our own lives.

When Jesus gave his summary of the law in Matthew 22, it was as a response to Pharisees testing him, trying to trap him into elevating some part of the law over the other. The passage isn't about Jesus telling us to all be good enough to please God. It is about summarizing the law for those who believed they could keep it fully.

#### WALLY'S GALLERY -

The season of Lent begins in the last week of this month. It is traditionally a season of fasting and penitence. Lent is significant in that it is one part of the two great cycles of the church year; one is Christmas and the other Easter. The Christmas cycle begins with the season of preparation known as Advent. Likewise Easter has its season of preparation that we call Lent



Today the forty days associated with Lent is in recognition of Jesus fasting during his 40 days in the wilderness. (Matthew 4:1-11) In actually, the 40 days of Lent is not hard and fast. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends of the day before Easter. If you were to count the number of days from Ash Wednesday of this year, for instance, until the day before Easter Sunday you would arrive at 46 days. The answer lies in the fact that generally Sundays are not considered part of the fasting period of Lent. Why? Because Sundays for the Anglican church are always Feast Days in celebration of Jesus resurrection! Further according to the Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church (Anglican compass web page) the current format for Lent (starting of Ash Wednesday and ending the day before Easter) began in Rome in the 7th century.

As was mentioned at the onset of this article, Lent its not only a season of fasting but also one of penitence. While fasting is associated with denial, penitence is about reflection on own condition. The realization that we as humans too often fall short of the measure God intended us to be; and we are in good company (if that term is appropriate).

Adam and Eve listened to Satan and ate from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil when God had forbid it. (Genesis 2:16-3:18) Abraham upon entering Egypt to escape the famine in Canaan lied to the Egyptians. Fearing for his own life he told the Egyptians that Sarah was his sister rather than his wife. (Genesis 12:11-17) Moses seeing an Egyptian beating a Hebrew slave, intervened and killed the Egyptian. To hide his crime, he buried his victim in the sand. (Exodus 2:12) Peter, who when asked by Jesus "But who do you say that I am?" Replied "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." (Matthew 16:15-16) Later when Jesus is arrested Peter denies knowing him three times. (Matthew 26:69-75) The great apostle Paul recognized his own fallen condition when he wrote: "For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I keep on doing. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no

From the time Adam and Eve disobeyed God until the time Jesus returns everything has changed. Paul described it this way - "For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now.

longer I who do it, but sin that dwells within me." (Romans 7:19-20)

#### THE SEASON OF EPIPHANY

Epiphany, celebrated January 6th, also known as "Three Kings Day", is a Christian holiday, marking the twelfth day of the Christmas season and the revelation of Christ as the son of God. It is also often the focus on the three magi (or "wise men") and their visit to baby Jesus in Bethlehem. The story goes that the three kings found baby Jesus by following the guidance of a mysterious star. This ends the season of Christmas and then begins a new season of ordinary time, growth and new life, color green, leading up to lent.

#### THE SEASON OF LENT

Lent is the observance of our Lord's passion and resurrection. It lasts a total of 40 days beginning with Ash Wednesday and ending Saturday, Easter Eve, at 6:00 P.M. It is, at this time, our church community is reminded of the pardon and absolution of our sins through Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior and how we need to renew our repentance and faith. In so doing, we examine ourselves and repent by prayer, fasting, and self denial; by reading and meditating God's holy Word, the Bible. To make right the sins we have committed.
